

Foundation to Announce New Officers at Annual Town Meeting February 10

The annual town meeting sponsored by the Edgewood Foundation will include the formal announcement of new officers for the foundation, as well as the traditional awarding of the William D. Limpert Award for Community Service, and a discussion of plans for beautification of the community.

The annual meeting will be held on Thursday, February 10 at 7 p.m. at the Edgewood Club. The purpose is to actively solicit ideas and input from the citizens of the borough on beautification projects as well as other projects the residents feel would be worthy of support from the Edgewood Foundation. It is an opportunity to participate in the plans for the borough for the coming year, as well as to voice your concerns and ideas to help move the borough forward.

Outgoing foundation president Lois Winslow, who is stepping down after many years in that position, will turn over the gavel to Vaughn Busch, a foundation board member since early 2004, who will be taking over as president. Lois will remain on the board as vice president.

Amy Andrews was recently appointed to the seat left vacant by the resignation of Kathi McShane. Board member Laura Horner has been appointed secretary.

Treasurer Wolf Goethert has resigned from the board. The foundation extends its sincere gratitude to him for his years of work. Gary Mulholland will take over as treasurer.

Fire Fighter Training

In order to serve you better, the EFD will be hosting training classes during February and March. A rapid intervention team class is scheduled for March. This trains the firefighters in the skills needed to rescue a firefighter lost or disoriented in a burning building, or trapped due to collapse of a building. A vehicle rescue class will also be held. So if you see numerous fire trucks in town this is why.

Equipment Upgrade

The department has recently upgraded our SCBA (air tanks) and portable radios. Although we did not get the Department of Homeland Security Grant, the upgrading of equipment was possible through our recent fund drive and the help of our treasurer, Dick Lithgow, crunching some numbers. The SCBA now bring the department into NFPA compliance for breathing apparatus; and the radios allow all members





to be equipped with one. We currently have submitted a grant to the Pennsylvania Fire Commissioner's office. Should we be granted this money, we will be upgrading coats, boots, pants and helmets. Our current gear has seen 15 working fires in a three-month period and is showing some wear. We also plan on purchasing an air filling station from Forest Hills FD.

More Thanks

For those who contacted Congressman's Doyle's office, thank you. I received word from his office that citizens of Edgewood called in regards to the grant. They have investigated this and will be working with the department in the future to help us. By Dave Andrews

Incident Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,563 calls for service in December 2004. There were 538 incidents reported, 160 complaints received and two accidents investigated, both of which resulted in personal injury.

Part I Crimes

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 24 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, 2 were burglary, 14 were shoplifting and seven were other crimes.

Arrests and Citations

There were 10 adult and two juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 42 traffic citations, eight parking citations and made no arrests for driving under the influence. There were four vandalism/ criminal mischief complaints and two narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 25 false alarm calls, took 261 reports, responded to 37 public nuisance complaints, wrote eight non-traffic citations and responded to 20 calls for medical assistance.

Borough Manager

Report to Council

This report includes the highlights of the borough manager's 2004 summary report made to borough council on December 20, 2004.

Parking

We implemented our new 3-5 a.m. parking system, which has lead to a significant decrease in complaints, and a lowering of our on-street parking fee by 57%.

For the first time, the borough paved parking lots this year, three of them in total, following through in its commitment to do so during discussions about 3 - 5 a.m. parking.

Grant Funding

We received applied for and received grants for:

- A new radio console system for our Communications Department
- A new movie projector for our Recreation Department, as well as new recreation equipment at a total cost of \$5,000.



We received over \$11,000 by providing documentation for the number of tons of recyclable materials collected. This year our DPW Department will have collected over 110 tons of recyclable material.

In 2004 Council authorized the application to DEP for recycling equipment and I believe we will be funded for over \$200,000.

Public Safety Investments

We purchased 1000 feet of new fiveinch fire hose for the fire department.

We have transitioned to a predominately full-time police force. There have been no claims filed this year against any of our officers and none since Chief Wood was hired by the borough.

We now have replaced our entire aging fleet of police cars and have a complete fleet of brand new vehicles, which includes brand new in car video equipment for each vehicle.

Insurance

Council approved changing our insurance period to a calendar year for the first time in the borough's history. This will allow us to accurately project insurance costs from year to year.

With the strong record of safety, standards, and accountability established, our insurance rates are being lowered in 2005 by approximately 5%. We had only eight days total lost to



injury. Our worker's compensation rates are going down and our borough rating, from our carrier, has increased dramatically in the last 12 months. The number of days lost at eight is down from the 70 lost in 2003 and the 2001 and 2002 collective total of approximately 750.

Not-So-Routine Maintenance

Borough Council authorized the Public Works Department to hot patch over one-half mile of Edgewood Avenue using 70 tons of asphalt.

We completed an \$80,000 renovation to Koenig Fieldhouse.

The borough completed the first sewage project under the consent order in Allegheny County this year. 1,200 feet of sanitary and storm sewer lines were replaced and the lower portion of Race Street was repaved at no additional cost to our residents.

Financial Planning

The borough renegotiated several contracts, most of which resulted in immediate savings to the borough including; animal services, mobile date terminal services, phones, copying machines, solid waste collection, phone equipment, auditing services, a cable franchising agreement, and tonight will vote on a two-year agreement with our building inspections company, and a one-year extension with Pennsylvania Municipal Company.



The borough collected over \$90,000 in delinquent taxes, its highest one year collection ever.

Even though it has not sold yet, we put out a bid to sell Parcel D.

Property Maintenance

We passed the new UCC building code and the 2003 international property maintenance code.

Our list of properties with downspout violations is now under 30. Three years ago this number was at about 400.

Dispatch

We have moved to a rotating system for our dispatch department. Call-offs are down 50%, overtime is down over 70% from two years ago, and we had three consecutive holidays where all our full-time dispatchers were off, the first time this has happened in at least 10 years.

Police Contract

We had a successful negotiation for a new three-year contract with our police department. Borough employees will contribute to the costs of the premium and the borough will switch plans in 2005. As a result of the switch and the borough's new cash-out provision, the borough will see an overall decrease in premiums from \$227,658.10 in 2004 to \$203,456.50 in 2005, even though there will be one more insured employee on the payroll in 2005.
