

ESO Music Director Morales to Conduct Two March Concerts

Walter Morales, who started his first season as music director of the Edgewood Symphony Orchestra this fall, will conduct the group in two concerts this spring.

The first will be held on Saturday, March 11 at 7:30 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church of Edgewood. The concert will feature a special presentation of the romantic Lalo Cello Concerto, performed by the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra's David Premo. Also on the program is Tchaikovsky's emotionally powerful Symphony No. 5.

On Saturday, March 25, the orchestra moves to Rodef Shalom Levy Hall for a 7:30 p.m. presentation of "A Soulful Celebration," featuring Nicole Myers on cello. Ms. Myers will perform Bruch's Kol Nedrei with the Symphony Orchestra. The ESO will also present Sibelius' Valse Triste and an encore performance of Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 5.


The 2007 refuse collection holiday season will begin on New Year's Day. Please join in the celebration by taking your trash to the curb on Thursday evenings those weeks.

This past summer he was the assistant conductor for the first Pittsburgh production of Wagner's Ring Cycle by the Opera Theater of Pittsburgh and the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. In August 2005, he performed at the National Flute Convention in San Diego with Lior Eitan, Wissam Boustany, and Gary Schocker. He has been associate conductor for the Rutgers Opera, and has also worked as accompanist for the Pittsburgh Symphony, Pittsburgh Opera, Mendelssohn Choir, Opera Theatre of Pittsburgh, Chatham College, and Charleston Opera. He has collaborated with such artists as Cuarteto Latinoamericano, Sarah Chang, Midori, Alexander Kerr, Walfrid Kujala, Jennifer Larmore, Julianne Baird, Herbert Perry, Anne Panagulias, and Meir Rimon.

As a pianist, Mr. Morales has performed in solo and chamber music recitals in Maryland, Washington, D.C., North Carolina, South Carolina,

Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and in New York City at Weill Recital Hall, Steinway Hall, and at Lincoln Center. He has won prizes at the University of Costa Rica Concerto Competition, the Carlos Enrique Vargas Piano Competition, the Southeastern Community College Competition, the MTNA South Carolina State Competition, the Silbermann Chamber Music Competition, the Carnegie Mellon Concerto Competition, the Pittsburgh Concert Society, and has appeared at the "Semanas Musicales de Frutillar" in Chile, the Piccolo Spoleto Festival, the Jill Watson Festival of the Arts, the International Piano Series and the Rutgers SummerFest.




Parent-Child Book Club




Another interesting item on display was an account ledger from the C.L. Johnston Grocery Store from 1894. This store was located at the corner of Maple and Swissvale Avenues now occupied by the firm of Lami Grubb Architects. The meat market section was beside the present day Edgewood Shoe Repair still operated by the Nuzzo family. There was a passageway behind this store that connected the two sections. It was interesting what the price of food was in 1894. A dozen eggs cost 25 cents (quite expensive).

On the internet through my post card hobby, I met Arthur F. Humphrey, III. His great grandfather the first Arthur F. Humphrey, President of the Westinghouse Air Brake Company (Union Switch and Signal was a division and the original plant was on the site of Edgewood Town Center) in 1919. He supplied me with a lot of information on the Humphrey family and the Air Brake. Of interest was a chart of the Air Brake and its subsidiary companies n 1919. The Humphrey family occupied the large house at the corner of Maple and Beech for most of the twentieth century.

In the near future there will be another program displaying artifacts from the files of the Society. This may be combined with a picnic.


911 Transition for Overnight Parking

With our transition to 911 complete, the borough has been working to deal with issues specific to Edgewood. The borough has a program whereby residents receive 60 call-in days per year for parking for overnight guests. This allows visitors to park overnight on the street without having to purchase a 3 - 5 a.m. permit.

The borough's staffing with the transition to 911 has changed. We no longer have 24-hour staffing at what was the dispatch department. The department still exists in a reconfigured manner, with hours than run Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. – 12 midnight

We have had to hire an answering service specifically for this overnight call-in program for the hours when we do not have staffing; that is, after midnight Monday through Friday and on the weekends.

There will be a couple of programmatic changes that will take place with



this answering service. First, if you call during the week you can still call in multiple nights at once. If you call anytime after midnight on Friday up until Monday morning, you may only report one day at a time. This is because of the way the answering service relays those overnight vehicles to our Police Department. If you call at 1 a.m., on Friday night, you will only be able to call in for that night. You will need to call back on Saturday if you will have a car on the street the next night. A solution to this would be to call the borough at (412) 242-4824 before 5 p.m. or (412) 242-9994 between five and midnight on Friday if you know that you will have a car on the street for multiple nights during the weekend.

Finally, the ordinance requiring cars to be called in by 2 a.m. will be enforced. The answering service will be instructed that calls must be received by that time and any calls coming in after 2 a.m. will not be able to make that night's list. Please make a note of this as well as the phone number to call to register an overnight vehicle. During borough hours, 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. Monday-Friday, you can still register an overnight vehicle by calling the administrative office at (412) 242-4824.

The borough appreciates your patience during this transition. If you have questions please call the office.

Activity Report

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,463 calls for service in December 2005. There were 516 incidents reported, 174 complaints received and 11 accidents investigated, of which three resulted in personal injury.

Part I crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 24 Part I crimes committed in the borough, three were burglary, 13 were shoplifting and seven were other crimes.

There were 12 adult and seven juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 25 traffic citations, 16 parking citations and made one arrest for driving under the influence were made. There were five vandalism/criminal mischief complaints and one narcotics offense.

Officers also responded to 17 false alarm calls, took 354 reports, responded to 19 public nuisance complaints, wrote 16 non-traffic citations and responded to 12 calls for medical assistance.



The three newest members to the department are currently enrolled in firefighting essentials and the enthusiasm from them wanting to learn has encouraged the rest of the department. By the spring of this year we should have most members certified as medical first responders. In addition three members will be taking EMT certification, that will bring the department 4 EMT's and a paramedic. Although we currently do not provide medical service through the fire department we are discussing this for the future. Now is the time to submit your application to get involved with an ever-growing department.



Know Your Firefighters

(Editor's Note: this is a continuation of an article that began in the last issue. It will be completed next month.)

Perhaps it would help to know who some of our bravest are, what kind of training is necessary to be a firefighter, and other duties performed by firefighters in Edgewood. By learning a little more about who our volunteer firefighters are, it may motivate some individuals to join the Department, if not to help their community, perhaps to help protect their family.

There are three classes of firefighters within the Edgewood Fire Department.



Class One is a firefighter who can fight fires inside and outside of a burning structure, and is fully trained to the same level as City of Pittsburgh firefighters.

Class Two firefighters provide assistance only outside of a burning building such as laying hose lines, filling air tanks, loading equipment back on the engine and other outside duties. They also receive much of the same training as Class One firefighters.

Class Three firefighters are those who help with fundraising such as helping with the hayrides, at Community Day and with Luminaria Sales. These firefighters are not trained in firefighting, nor can they participate at the scene of a fire. However, their importance in fundraising is of invaluable assistance in keeping the Fire Department financially sound.
