

Limpert Award Highlight of Annual Town Meeting

Mark your calendars for 7:30 p.m. on February 15 for the annual Town Meeting sponsored by the Edgewood Foundation and held at the Edgewood Club. This is a great opportunity to hear what has been referred to as State of the Borough addresses by our mayor, borough council president and other community leaders.

New Format

This year there will be a more informal approach to the meeting. It will start with a welcome by the Edgewood Foundation and follow with introductions of our community leaders and organizations. There will be table space for pamphlets and brochures and ample time to have informal discussions about these organizations. There will not be individual speeches by organizations, but instead, there will be introductions for each organization and then break off into small groups for discussions.

Limpert Award

The finale of the evening will be the presentation of the William D. Limpert Volunteer Service Award. This prestigious award is made annually, and many Edgewood volunteers have been honored.

Bill Limpert was the founding president of the Edgewood Foundation and set a high standard for community service in the borough. He served as a council member, school board member, and several community boards, including the Recreation Board, the Library Board, and the Woodland Hills Advisory Board. The William D. Limpert Volunteer Service Award was created in his honor, and the first award was given to him posthumously.

Award History

The 1992 awardee was John B. Major, who served as council member, mayor, vestryman at his church, and on the library board. Following closely the example set for us all, Major said "William Limpert gave a new meaning to 'community volunteer': he was always there and made it fun to work with him."

Angelina Sammarone was the third recipient. She worked extensively for the Civic Association, where she was instrumental in producing the Edgewood Directory; Meals on Wheels; Girl Scouts; and Crime Watch, where she helped organize the calling tree and served as police contact for the distribution of messages.

Robert Fuchs received the award in 1994. He coached Little League, baseball, basketball and softball; served on the board of the Edgewood Club; served on the committee for the Edgewood Centennial, which grew into Community Day. He served on the committee for the first senior dinner, and acted as Santa for the Foundation.

Robert P. Gibson was the 1995 awardee, receiving the honor posthumously. He was a charter member of the Edgewood Volunteer Fire Department, served two terms on Borough Council, where he worked to persuade 1,128 residents to plant new trees in their front yards.


Nevin Rodes was honored in 1996 for his involvement with the boards of the Edgewood Symphony Orchestra, Edgewood Historic Society, Edgewood Civic Association and Regent Square Civic Association.

Susan Bailey followed, with strong associations with the Civic Association and the Crime Watch.

Doris Jones, president of the Edgewood Garden Club and the Historical Society, received the award in 1998.

Brian Nogrady, champion of the effort to bring light rail transit to the Eastern suburbs, and a Main Line Park project along the Martin Luther King, Jr. Busway, was the 1999 recipient.

Long-time Edgewoodian Jay Bush received the Limpert award in 2000. He has served on the boards of the Edgewood Club, the library, and the

Edgewood Foundation. He was the chairman of the Centennial Celebration in 1988, and spent 12 years on Borough Council. He mentioned previous recipients John B. Major and Bill Limpert as major influences on his life in Edgewood.

Founding director of the Edgewood 5K Dick Monheim won the race for the award in 2001. Monheim also served as a baseball and basketball coach, but the race was his biggest claim to fame. Of Bill Limpert, Monheim said, "There was never anyone in the borough, or never will be anyone, who gave more." Monheim also commented on the fact that the race brought people into Edgewood who saw its beauty (and its hills) for the first time.

The family name came up again in 2002, when Mary Limpert won the award founded in honor of her husband.



New Year; No New Tax

Happy New Year. Borough Council passed the 2007 budget without a tax increase and with several very important items for staff to pursue. We continue to focus on providing high quality services and focusing on the needs of the borough in a very planned fashion.

Paving will be done early in the year and will include the Oakview Avenue and Ivy Street parking lots as well as completing paving on Locust and Washington and beginning phased paving on Hawthorne and Edgewood Avenue.

Koenig Field Improvements

The borough has recently finished the installation of new fencing and backstops at Koenig Field and has also completed renovations to the Fieldhouse. The borough will be purchasing a new electronic scoreboard in the spring. The backstops and scoreboard will total over \$27,000 and have been paid for by grants that the borough has received over the past year. We will continue to provide our recreation programs including our movie nights during the summer, which have been very successful

Tough Times for Local Governments

If you read the papers you know that local governments are facing very difficult times. The cost of many needed services seems to doubling every three to five years. This includes the price for garbage pickup, street paving, and other contracted services. Health insurance costs have risen another 20% in 2007

I will continue to manage your tax dollars strictly. It is often the tendency with both business and government to expand. Well-intentioned employees are always looking to improve services, update equipment, and essentially spend money. We always will address those tendencies by asking at what cost and with what goal in mind? Saying no is often a very unpopular, but a very necessary thing to do.

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Town Meeting

On November 17, the Edgewood Police Department held its third annual Town Meeting at the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf. Although attendance was low this year, the plan is to continue this annual event. It is an opportunity for residents to hear what their police department has accomplished over the past year, as well as the goals for the future. The event gives residents an opportunity to ask questions and voice their opinions.

We would like to extend thanks to the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf for allowing us to use their facilities and for providing delectable cookies and beverages to the attendees.

Changes in Alarm Fees

In 2007 false alarm fees will change slightly. Residents will still get one free false alarm per year. There will be a \$30 fee for the second false alarm, and for false alarms three through seven, there will be a \$50 fee for each occurrence. These rates have stayed the same as 2006. However, if a residence or business has eight or more false alarms per year, a \$100 fee per occurrence will be assessed. If prompt payment is not made, a 10% late fee will be added, or your information may be turned over to the magistrate for prosecution. Starting with January 1 each year, residents will continue to start at zero false alarms.


Click It or Ticket Program

During the week of Thanksgiving, the Edgewood Police Department participated in Buckle Up Pennsylvania's Click It or Ticket Program for nighttime seat belt usage. Officers were out on patrol between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. to enforce the seatbelt law to During this enforcement motorists. time, officers conducted 43 traffic stops and issued 37 traffic citations. Citations issued were: ten seatbelt, two child safety, five suspended drivers, 17 moving violations, and two for other violations. There was also one warrant arrest made.

As a direct result of law enforcement's commitment, Pennsylvania's seat belt usage rate has reached an unprecedented high of 83.3 percent. That translates into dozens of lives saved and thousands of injuries prevented. Police are making a difference by enforcing our seatbelt laws. For more information, visit www.buckleuppa.org.

Resignation

Activity Report December 2006

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,340 calls for service in December 2006. There were 446 incidents reported, 268 complaints received and 13 accidents investigated, one of which resulted in personal injury, and 12 of which resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 31 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, 21 were shoplifting, one was aggravated assault and nine were other crimes. There were no robberies, burglaries or motor vehicle thefts.

There were eight adult and three juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 82 traffic citations, 105 parking citations and made two arrests for driving under the influence. There were six vandalism/criminal mischief complaints and no narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 25 false alarm calls, took 261 reports, responded to 26 public nuisance complaints, wrote two non-traffic citations and responded to 13 calls for medical assistance.

Tax Time

Borough Taxes

The 2006 Edgewood Borough Real Estate Taxes have been turned over to the delinquent tax collector. If you had an additional assessment bill which is still due at face, please get these to me by the due date to avoid additional penalties. Also, remember that the school tax and borough tax cannot be combined in one check. You must send two separate checks. The 2007 tax bills will be out the first of April.

School Tax Installments

If you are making installments for your Woodland Hills School taxes, your third installment is due by February 28. If you forgot to pay your second installment, you must add 10% to the total amount still due. If you have changed mortgage companies or



are now paying your own taxes, please call the Allegheny County Treasurer's office and my office so we have the proper mailing address. My phone number is (412) 731-0200, and my office hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 10 a.m.-12 p.m. until March 31, when I will return to my regular hours.

2004 saw "Druggy" owner Dick Lithgow honored. In her nomination, his daughter Susan wrote, "Perhaps




one of the most valuable things Dick has given to Edgewood has been the role of unofficial 'counselor' to Edgewood youth while he owned the Edgewood Pharmacy."
