

Borough Bids Farewell to Manager Kurt Ferguson

Borough Manager Kurt Ferguson will be leaving Edgewood to take on a position in Westmoreland County at the end of March. Kurt has served Edgewood since September of 2002.

During his tenure here, Kurt has helped Edgewood transition to a full time police department, replace all public works vehicles and equipment, and upgrade Koenig Field. In the past year, significant improvements to South Braddock Avenue have been made. "Edgewood has many reasons to be indebted to Mr. Ferguson," said Heidi McDonald, Vice President of Edgewood Borough Council. "He singlehandedly oversaw the paving of South Braddock Avenue in a deal that procured nearly a million dollars worth of paving for only \$22,000, which was then covered by a grant he obtained. He streamlined many borough operations, from recreation programs, to getting most of the public works equipment replaced, to offering borough employees a healthcare buyout option which saves the employees and the borough a lot of money. He is not just the most proactive person I've ever met, but, he is an absolute beast when it comes to number-crunching, and does one of the funnier British accents I've ever heard. He will be difficult to replace and sorely missed."

Kurt is most proud of the fact that during seven budget seasons, taxes in Edgewood have not been raised. "On behalf of the residents of the Borough of Edgewood, I would like to publicly thank Kurt Ferguson for helping us keep our taxes the same for so many years," said Mayor Jean Davin. "Without his aggressive budget management, ability to obtain grants, and negotiating skills with other governmental entities, this borough would not be in the great financial shape it is currently in. We owe him a big debt of gratitude, and wish him great success in all of his endeavors."

Edgewood Borough Council has already begun the process to find the new borough manager. Kurt feels confident that his replacement will be able to make a seamless transition. "We have structures in place so that the new manager can pick up and know what the processes are," Kurt said.

In his new job as Hempfield Township Manager, he will join two former Edgewood employees in that government. Mike Volpe, who served as public works director, and Dean Minerva, who was recreation director, are both employed there. Kurt believes the fact that Hempfield will now have three former Edgewood employees is a credit to the borough. "This town has high expectations regarding services," said Kurt. "That translates into employees being attractive to other municipalities."

Hempfield, has a population of approximately 45,000. Kurt is looking forward to challenging himself personally. "I've always been very focused on finance and budget," Kurt said. "It will be interesting to take my approach and see how well I can do on a much larger scale." Hempfield has not raised taxes in nineteen years. Kurt is motivated to continue that trend into the twentieth year.

Leaving his position here was a difficult decision for Kurt. He feels attached to what is happening in this community. When the borough found itself without a recreation director, Kurt stepped in to fill the void. "That was the best thing that happened while I was here," Kurt said. "Edgewood is fortunate. Not many towns this size have the sorts of things we have, like baseball games and movie night. I felt fortunate to see firsthand how some of the money we spent went to improve the quality of life here. It was very rewarding. Being able to go down and umpire six-year-olds is an unexpected benefit of this job."



If you are used to managing your library account from your home or work computer, you will now need a pin number. This is an added layer of




security which will protect you if your card is lost or stolen, and will keep the personal information in *My Account* private.

All events are free of charge unless otherwise noted. Please adhere to reservation requirements. Reservations for any of the programs listed can be made by calling the library at (412) 731-0909.





A Message from the Superintendent of Woodland Hills School District



Dear Edgewood Residents:

The Woodland Hills School District has kicked off an informational campaign to gauge parents' reactions to several new academic proposals. The district has established dedicated phone lines, posted online surveys on the district website (www.whsd.net), and mailed letters to parents of students with children in pre-kindergarten through fifth grade to determine interest in the idea of an academy.

The district plans to use Woodland Hills Academy as a specialized kindergarten to grade six program that includes longer classroom hours, foreign language instruction, smaller classroom sizes, uniforms, and greater interaction between parents and teachers. Enrollment would be based on a lottery system. Interested parents are asked to complete the online survey or call (412) 256-3329.

The second program would provide free college for Woodland Hills students through a dual enrollment program with the Community College of Allegheny County. The district would pay for all tuition costs, books, and transportation for program participants. Students would still be able to participate in athletics and extra-curricular activities. Parents are invited to complete the online survey at www.whsd.net or call (412) 256-3325.

One more program that we are exceptionally proud of is the College Access Challenge Grant Program. Woodland Hills High School is one of only seven schools in the entire state chosen to be part of the new program. It is coordinated through the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), Project GRAD USA and the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA). The program mission is to dramatically increase the percentage of PA students that attend postsecondary education.

These are just a few of the exciting initiatives in our plans for the Woodland Hills School District. More information will continue to be available on our website.


Congratulations!

Our goal is to promote Woodland Hills School District's success and to keep Edgewood Primary School as an integral part of the school district, and an important community resource.




What can you do to help us keep positive momentum in these times of uncertainty and cynicism?

Information Made Easier

The State of Pennsylvania passed a right-to-know law on February 14, 2008. This law required every community to create an open records officer, and establish procedures for when an individual makes a request for public information. Essentially, every community in the commonwealth was already legally required to make this information available, but this law did draw attention to the issue and outlined more specific provisions regarding the public's access to these records. You may have seen articles in area papers where many communities, especially smaller boroughs, had no idea about the new law or what obligations they had to their residents.

The borough's application form for public records is available on our website, or at the borough building. Copies of records will cost \$.25 per page. Other items, such as building blue prints and GIS maps, will have a set fee that covers the specific copying cost of that item.

Many of the inquiries we have received are for information that is already available online. All legislation passed by borough council, including our zoning ordinance, is on our website at www.edgewoodboro.com. Once on the site, click borough information, then borough ordinances to see the entire code of ordinances. By entering a keyword into the search feature, you will be able to see everything we have on the books concerning that issue. All of our minutes from the previous year are also online. If you can't find what you are looking for, you can certainly call the office to check if the information is available on the website.

If the information is not available online, you will find the application request form on the website, listed under open records. The borough will have up to five days to provide you with the information, and again the cost is \$.25 per page. A request that is denied will be done so in writing.

If you are uncertain where information is located, or if you have questions about any records please call our office at (412) 242-4824 and we will do our best to provide you with what you need.

Free Curbside Appliance Recycling Program

The Allegheny County Health Department has launched a program offering free pick up and recycling of refrigerantcontaining appliances. The program is available to Allegheny County residents only, and includes refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, water coolers and other household appliances that contain refrigerants. No commercial appliances will be accepted. Recycling these types of appliances will prevent ozone depleting refrigerants from being released into the air.

"Removing refrigerants from these appliances and recycling them is a win-win-win for the economy, the environment and public health," said County Health Director Dr. Bruce W. Dixon.

To arrange for curbside pick up of an appliance, call the Appliance Warehouse, who is under contract with the Health Department, at 1-888-GO-FREON.



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A New Look

Thanks to the support of the fund drive, a grant from FEMA's Assistance to Fire Fighters and the PA Fire Commissioners Office the EVFD will be purchasing 20 sets of protective clothing.

Over the last two years, the department has grown and new members needed to be provided with equipment. The cost of a complete set is \$3,000. Without the grants and support citizens have provided we were looking at a major debt to outfit all the fire fighters.

The new gear will meet all current national standards. The next major grant we will look into will be for air tanks used to enter areas under hazardous conditions.

The EVFD is grateful for the support it receives from the borough, but as you can see the equipment needed to protect the fire fighters that serve the community has a hefty price tag. Again, it is your support through the fund drive, luminary, and chicken dinner sales that make it possible to make these purchases.

January Calls

Since January, the EVFD has answered 38 calls for service. The majority of the calls have been motor vehicle accidents. The remainder is what we classify as "smells and bells." The translation to that would be fire alarms and odor investigations. Congratulations to the community for being educated in fire safety and prevention. Now if we could just teach people how to be cautious while driving.

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Delinquent Bills

The 2008 Edgewood Borough Real Estate Taxes have been turned over to PAMS as delinquent. If you did not pay, you will be getting a letter from them in the next few months. The 2009 tax bill comes out the last week of March. If you have changed mortgage companies, or are now paying your own taxes, please make sure you call my office at (412) 731-0200 to let me know where to send your tax bill. Also call the Allegheny County Treasurers office at (412) 350-4100 and let them know of any changes.

Tax Time

The Woodland Hills School tax is now due at penalty until June 15. If you were paying in installments and missed one, make sure you add the 10% penalty to the late installment. If two installments were late you will not be eligible to pay in installments next year.


Striving to Protect Children

The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,015 calls


for service in January. There were 328 incidents reported, 155 complaints received and nine accidents investigated, one of which resulted in personal injury, eight resulted in property damage.


Part I crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 23 Part I crimes committed in the borough, there were two for robbery, two for burglary, two for aggravated assault and two other crimes.

There were six adult and one juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 22 traffic citations and 252 parking citations. Two arrests for driving under the influence were made. There were two vandalism/criminal mischief complaints.

Officers also responded to 17 false alarm calls, took 124 reports, responded to 19 public nuisance complaints, wrote four non-traffic citations and responded to 11 calls for medical assistance.
