

### Warren Cecconi Brings Years of Experience to Edgewood

Edgewood Borough Council appointed Warren Cecconi as Edgewood Borough Manager during the council meeting on March 2. Warren will replace Kurt Ferguson, as manager, on April 6.

Warren brings years of experience to the borough, he began his career as Public Works Director in Swissvale and has served as manager in Bridgeville, Swissvale and Dormont. Warren says that every community is a little bit different, but his main focus in each place has been keeping taxes under control.

Warren is no stranger to Edgewood. He has worked with Edgewood Borough Council as Swissvale Borough Manager on many projects, including the Joint Comprehensive Plan Project involving Swissvale, Edgewood and Rankin. This was a long term plan for development in each community. Part of the plan made sure the rules on the Swissvale side of Regent Square matched those on the Edgewood side.

Warren sought the Edgewood position in part because he is so familiar with the area, and the government here. He says he has always liked the community and thought it would be a great opportunity. "Edgewood has always had a nice little niche in the East Hills," Warren said. "I have always thought of it as a great community."

Warren says he is looking forward to working closely with the council and the mayor to address the needs of Edgewood and move the community forward. He is interested in continuing the established sidewalks and landscaping along the busway, from Swissvale through Edgewood.

Edgewood Borough Council President, Pat Schaefer believes Warren will be a great addition to the community. "Warren has an excellent reputation in the local government community," she said. "His experience, knowledge in grant writing, the Inter-municipal Comprehensive Plan, and the concerns and attributes of Edgewood and our sister communities will be a great asset as we move forward together."

As the chief administrative officer appointed by the council, Warren will be responsible for carrying out the policies, and enforcing the ordinances of the council. His duties will include grant procurement, oversight of public works, recreation, police, and fire departments, as well as development and management of special projects.

### **CCML Awarded Historic Preservation Grant**

The Board of Trustees of the C.C. Mellor Memorial Library and Edgewood Community House recently received an award of a \$76,000 Keystone Historic Preservation Grant. The grant will support ongoing infrastructure projects on the historic building at One Pennwood Avenue.

This highly-competitive matchingdollar grant award has brought the library much closer to fully funding their building preservation plan by 2010. It would not have been possible without the generous support of community members who contributed to the building preservation drive.

In late spring look for the pergola, brick patio, staircase, and front walkway resurfacing projects to be completed. Chimney lining, complete external masonry repairs, and gutter and downspout restoration will follow. Finally, ornamental iron and millwork will be replaced, followed by stucco and paint. The library has raised \$277,000 for the building preservation project from federal, state, local and private contributions. While they have secured funds from private foundations, they still need to raise \$50,500 of the \$328,000 budget.

#### WiseWalk



The Edgewood Police Department responded to and handled 1,363 calls for service in February. There were 292

incidents reported, 148 complaints received and 5 accidents investigated, 2 of which resulted in personal injury, and 3 resulted in property damage.

Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 15 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, there were zero for robbery, motor vehicle theft, burglary, shoplifting, and aggravated assault. There was one other crime. There were 6 adult and zero juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 46 traffic citations and 556 parking citations. Three arrests for driving under the influence were made. There was one vandalism/criminal mischief complaint and no narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 12 false alarm calls, took 144 reports, responded to 19 public nuisance complaints, and responded to 15 calls for medical assistance.

Even though the fire department has grown in membership over the years, we still can use more help. I recently received an email from the PA Fire and Emergency Service Institute which included an article by Ken North. According to the article, volunteer fire service in Pennsylvania and the nation is at a critical juncture. While the strong tradition and "can-do" spirit continues, there are serious and ever-increasing challenges to the survival of the volunteer fire service. Today's firefighters respond to all kinds of emergency calls, all requiring intensive training and specific equipment. Such activity demands a substantial time commitment from volunteer schedules already crowded with work and family.

The most concerning issue is the steep and steady decline in the number of volunteers attracted to these vital services. Studies done in 2001 by Penn-sylvania Department of Community and Economic Development estimated the number of active firefighters as 70,000, down from about 75,000 in 1995, or a six percent decline.

As the number of volunteers declines, raising money to operate fire companies will become more difficult. It will perhaps require increased funding from municipalities, resulting in higher municipal taxes.

A recent study by Pennsylvania Fire and Emergency Services Institute estimated that volunteer fire companies save about \$6 billion a year for state and local governments.

Based on the study, here is an example of the cost per year to operate a fire department with one engine and one rescue truck: \$418,000 for an NFPA equipped engine; \$443,000 for an NFPA equipped rescue; \$1,400,000 for 20 employees (benefits excluded); \$48,000 for personal protective equipment; and \$2,661,000 for fire and rescue protection. Maintenance, fuel, heat, etc., are not included.

fundraising, grants, and community donations to meet our budgets. Volunteers are asked to devote even more time to raise money for the jobs they already do at no cost to the community.

Changing demographics, work habits, job locations and personal habits have also had a negative impact on the volunteer fire service. The result, in many cases, can be delayed responses, scratched calls, insufficient manpower for emergency calls, reduced ability to function as a business, loss of revenue, loss of personnel, inability to maintain equipment and physical property and increased liabilities for volunteers and local governments.

What can you do? Local volunteer fire departments can use help with non-emergency activities - such as working the kitchen, calling bingo, selling tickets, cleaning the station and equipment, fundraising, fire prevention activities and cash donations.

What are the rewards? The satisfaction of helping to save someone's life or property is a huge, self-gratifying feeling that can't be obtained by sitting on the sidelines watching.

Mv office hours are Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. The last two weeks of May, I will be in the office every day except May 25 due to the holiday. Taxes are due by May 31 at discount, but because it falls on a Sunday, I will accept them until June 1. I will also accept a postmark of June 1. If it is

With the change in postage rates, remember to have the right amount on your selfaddressed stamped envelope.

The Woodland Hills School Tax is now due at penalty. If you were paying in installments and forgot one, you must add the 10% penalty to the amount due. If you missed two installments, you will not be allowed to pay in installments next year. I will collect these taxes until June 15, after which time they will be turned over to Jordan Tax Service.

My office will be closed the week of May 11, and will reopen on Monday, May 18. If you have tax questions, feel free to call me or stop in.

#### Get Ready for Your Home's Occupancy Inspection

The borough requires occupancy inspections whenever occupants in a rental property change or when a property changes owners. The occupancy inspection is basically a safety inspection. A dye test by an Allegheny County registered plumber is also required. Allen Ayres, Building Code Official with Building Inspection Underwriters of Pennsylvania, Inc. says that some of the things your property will checked for are peeling paint, roof condition, missing brick or siding, vents for furnaces and hot water tanks, interior surfaces, and bad wiring. One smoke detector is required for each of the following: the first floor, the hallway outside bedrooms, in each bedroom, and in a walk up attic. The basement is required to have a hard wired detector with a battery back-up. All other detectors may be battery powered. If the property includes a garage, that will also be inspected.

The fee for these inspections is \$45 per unit for residential properties and \$75 per unit for commercial properties. Applications for both the occupancy inspection and dye test can be found at the borough office.


