CALEA Recognition for Edgewood Police Department

The Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, known as (CALEA), was created in 1979 as a credentialing authority through joint efforts of law enforcement's major executive associations including the International Association of Chiefs of Police and others.

The purpose of CALEA's Accreditation Program is to improve the delivery of public safety services by maintaining a body of standards developed by public safety practitioners. This accreditation process is a proven modern management model, which promotes the efficient use of resources and improves law enforcement service delivery.

Approximately two and half years ago, the Edgewood Police Department decided to undergo the rigorous process of achieving CALEA recognition. I am proud to report that on November 21, 2009, I attended the CALEA conference in Salt Lake City. I attended the final hearing at this conference and made a presentation to the CALEA Commission on our attempt to reach CALEA recognition. As a result of this presentation and the examination of the hard work all members of this police department put into the required compliance standards, the Edgewood Police Department was awarded its CALEA Recognition.

We are currently the only municipal police agency in Western Pennsylvania that is a CALEA Recognized law enforcement agency. This is something of which the community, its leaders and this police department can be very proud.

Library

Because of funding cuts in the 2009-2010 state budget, county and state libraries have been forced to make a number of changes in services. C. C. Mellor Memorial Library has reduced staff hours and will be spending less on new materials this year. Changes have been made in the way requests for library materials are made. To cut down on the number of items going through delivery, all holds are filled with the local copy first. Drastic cuts were made to the subscriptions used by Power Pennsylvania, the electronic reference source used by both students and the general public. Although the countywide eiNetwork is hoping to subscribe to some of these, the number and types of databases available are in flux.

Governor Rendell has released his 2010-2011 proposed budget which calls for an additional \$1.2 million cut in public library subsidies. There will be much talk in Harrisburg about the budget between now and July 1.

The C. C. Mellor Memorial Library needs your support. You can help by participating in library fundraisers, donating to the library, volunteering, and contacting your legislator.

Ready to clean your house and make money at the same time? Worried about the weather on Saturdays in May? Fines and Fees

At the beginning of 2010, Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh raised their fines. If you return your overdue items at CCML, you will pay only \$.25 a day for adult print material and audio books and \$.10 a day for children's print and audio items. Fines for DVDs and CD-ROMs are \$1 a day.

The library allows you to check out items if you have fines under \$10. We do this as a courtesy, since we all get caught without enough cash or not realizing that an item is overdue. Our fine threshold is not meant to be a permanent loan. The library's budget is tight, we ask that you pay all of your fine or a little bit at a time. We'll even allow you to volunteer at the library to reduce fines; teens may also participate

in this. Please work with us to pay off your balance. It will help us all.

Stormy Weather

The library has never closed because of inclement weather. Most of the employees live nearby so we can get here in all kinds of conditions. If your items are coming due and you can not get to the library to return them, you can do one of two things: call the library to renew them at (412)731-0909, or renew online at www.ccmellorlibrary.org. Do not renew on the automated phone line because these renewals are not always successful. If your items are overdue, you'll need to call the library for renewals.

Census Questionnaire Assistance

Trained census employees will be on hand at the library beginning March 19 to help individuals in filling out their census forms. Census workers can help those who have trouble with language, seeing the form, or need clarification of questions on the form. Assistance is free and done on a walkin basis. Times will be announced in early March.

Correct census data helps the library receive funding. The library receives per capita funding from state aid, table games, and RAD funding.

Stand Up and Be Counted

The 2010 Census is coming up and your participation is vital to our neighborhood. The results of the census are used to distribute congressional seats, plan for community services, and to distribute federal funds to state and local government. Census results help determine funding to our local library. The results also help to attract new businesses to the area and affects planning for transportation, hospitals, and health services. A few quick facts about the 2010 census:

- You are required by law to participate in the census.
- The 2010 Census is comprised of 10 easy questions that take less than 10 minutes to complete.
- Federal law protects the information you share during the census.



Tax Time

The 2010 Edgewood Borough Real Estate Tax will be mailed out the first of April. The new millage will be set at 8.161, which is up one and a half mills from last year. If you have not paid your 2009 tax, you will be receiving a notice shortly from PAMS. I am no longer collecting this tax.

The 2009 Woodland Hills School Tax is now due at penalty. If you were paying in installments and missed your second or third one, please remember to add the additional 10% on the the remaining balance. I will be collecting these until around the 15th of May. If you need info about the wage tax please call PAMS at (412) 829-0567.

If you need copies of your 2009 taxes and did not send in a self addressed stamped envelope with your taxes, there will now be a \$5 fee.

My office is open Monday and Thursday from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. I will be open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. the last two weeks of the discount period. The last day of discount is Memorial Day so I will accept taxes on June 1 and also accept a postmark of June 1. If you have any questions, please feel free to call me at (412) 731-0200 and I will get back to you as soon as I can. Thank you.

incidents reported, 153 complaints received and nine accidents investigated, nine of which resulted in property damage.



Part I Crimes are the more serious crimes of homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Of the 18 Part I Crimes committed in the borough, there were zero for robbery, one for motor vehicle theft, one for burglary, 13 for shoplifting, one for aggravated assault and two other crimes.

There were four adult and four juvenile arrests made for felony and misdemeanor violations.

Edgewood officers wrote a total of 44 traffic citations, 551 parking citations and made two arrests for driving under the influence. There were two vandalism/criminal mischief complaints and zero narcotics offenses.

Officers also responded to 19 false alarm calls, took 75 reports, responded to four public nuisance complaints, wrote five non-traffic citations and responded to 16 calls for medical assistance.
