## **Borough "Home Improvement" Projects for 2011**

This year, we will be making much-needed improvements to the Borough Building, purchasing a new multi-tasking street sweeper and continuing road paving.

The cost to replace the original, single-pane windows in the Borough Building, with similar style energy-efficient windows is over \$88,000. The current windows are cracked, broken beyond repair, and drain heat from the building, driving up heating costs. We plan to begin that process in 2011, as the budget allows. In addition, necessary repairs to the heating system will cost about \$10,000. Updated security cameras will also be installed at a cost of just under \$3,600.

The Borough will also need to replace the 15 year-old street sweeper as the cost to keep the current sweeper functioning is no longer feasible. After looking at the necessary criteria (like being able to fit under the trestle, necessary multi-functions) and researching our options, we will purchase the sweeper from Golden Equipment Company at a cost of \$169,000. This equipment will be used not only for street sweeping, but for collecting leaves in the fall and cleaning the catch basins that are part of the storm sewer svstem.

The Borough has also consulted with an engineering firm to perform a study of Edgewood's roads and develop a long-term Capital Improvement Program to assist with road repair and paving priorities. The study will be completed this spring (or after the spring thaw!) and will be available online for your review.

## "New" Newsletter

The Edgewood Newsletter has a new look. There have been many comments and a few concerns about the changes and we would like to take a moment to address some of those.

One area that seems most concerning to residents is the cost of the new Newsletter, specifically the paper quality and the addition of color. The Newsletter is actually costing the Borough less to print now than it had previously. We are working closely

with Lionworks printing, which is run by the Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf. The switch to Lionworks was mutually beneficial, the Borough was able to cut cost and WPSD uses the print shop as a vocational tool for its students. In addition to providing the printing, WPSD students also provide the mailing service at no charge to the Borough.

The Edgewood Newsletter has always been an amazing source of Council, Police, and Borough news. The numerous comments and suggestions that have been received indicate that you, the residents, would like more personal interest news as well. Taking that into consideration, you will notice a few new articles such as, Mayor's Minute, Spotlight on Local Business, and New to the Neighborhood. There are more articles in development and your input is always welcomed and appreciated.

Although Mother Nature was against us, the EVFD has been vigorously training. We have continued to hone our skills by conducting Rapid Intervention Team training indoors. We have gone over identifying types of construction and the components of construction to downed firefighter removal from the basement of the Borough Building. We currently have five members enrolled in Basic Vehicle Rescue training. Once they

complete this class, they will be

certified as rescue technicians.

Two members from the department will be taking advantage of the Fire Vest program, free tuition and books to CCAC to obtain an Associate's degree in Fire Science Administration. Jared Amos, is a senior who will be graduating from Woodland Hills High School this year, and I will be school mates. The program is offered through Allegheny County. The requirements are that you are a member of a fire department in Allegheny County, commit to five years of service to that department and will achieve Fire Fighter I certification. If you are interested in this, please contact me.

There is an opening for the livein program at the station. College students looking for an off-campus apartment and who work with a fire department should contact me at firechief@edgewoodboro.com. Captain Ben Reynolds, live-in



coordinator, will be in touch with you to describe the particulars.

The QRS program is generating more calls for the department. In January and February, we ran a total of 62 fire and QRS calls. We have had great feedback from Eastern Area Pre-Hospital Service on our response time and number of EMS on the scene, as well as treatment of the patients. On several occasions, the patient was unable to get to the door and we had to use a window or force entry. By being able to do this, plus treat the patient, time was saved. Time is of the essence in a medical emergency. I applaud the members who have taken on this branch of the department to provide a greater service to the Borough of Edgewood.

Personality of A Police Officer

Being a police officer has many unique challenges which many other professions do not. We leave our homes, families, and our friends, unable to predict what our shift may bring. We may put in our eight hours and handle only one or two calls for service. We may work our eight hours and respond to so many calls that we won't have time to eat, take a short break, or do the many hours of paperwork required with each call for service.

When the dispatcher calls your badge number, you never know what type of call you're going to be sent on. The call may be a simple disabled vehicle, or it may be a violent domestic call. This is where an officer's job is different from most. You begin recalling all of your training and past experiences which will enable you to do your job to the best of your ability, allowing you to survive to answer another call.

These calls can wear you down physically, mentally and emotionally. You may deal with a medical call where you see someone's loved one dying of cancer. You may be on a shooting call, exposing officers to scenes that no one should ever have to see. You may deal with a drug dealer who does not want to go back to jail and will fight to the end to remain free. Please keep in mind that seeing and hearing the things that we do does affect us.

Police officers are held to a higher standard than most. We are expected to be respectful, polite, and understanding on every call, even if the person we are dealing with is not. We will always do our best to be upbeat and have a positive attitude. We will always try to handle ourselves with dignity and treat everyone the way they deserve to be treated.

The Edgewood Police Department knows that what makes performing this

job a little easier is having residents, such as each of you, who appreciate what we do and understand what we experience.

## District Attorney Recognizes Police Departments

On February 11, 2011 District Attorney Steven Zappala gave his thanks to the Edgewood and Swissvale police departments for working together to rapidly end the string of robberies in the Regent Square area. The DA lauded the police saturation in the area and the communication between the two departments.

During the meeting, the announcement was also made that there will be new surveillance cameras along S. Braddock Avenue within the next 60 days. Each camera costs approximately \$9,000 with the monies coming from the DA office's budget. The cameras will run continuously in common areas, with live feed to police stations and patrol cars that are properly equipped. There has also been budget approval for sobriety checkpoints in the area.

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# Black History Brought to Life at Dickson

Life at DICKSON Local ceramics artist, Mr. Jim McDowell of Edgewood, brought history to life for 4th and 5th graders at Dickson Elementary on Monday, February 21. Mr. McDowell is well known for creating "face jugs," an African American folk art.

Mr. McDowell demonstrated how to throw pots and other ceramic pieces on a pottery wheel. Intermixed with his live demonstration, he regaled the students with stories about black history, and in particular the significance of face jugs in the African American culture. He also spoke about his family history and shared personal anecdotes that underscored the importance of reading and education in discovering "who you are" and what path you need to take to find success in the world and happiness in life.

Students had the opportunity to help make the face jugs and Mr. McDowell graciously donated all of the jugs made during the presentation to the school.

The visit by Mr. McDowell was the culmination of a joint project that integrated curriculum from Library Science, Art, and Language Arts classes, and was organized by Dickson Librarian Elizabeth Casey and Art Teacher Beth Wagner. The project featured a study of Dave the Potter, a book about a gifted and literate slave potter and poet who lived in Edgefield, SC in the 1800's. Students learned about Dave as they read, discussed and studied the book, researched facts about "Dave," created their own "face jugs," and composed poetry.

Throughout his presentation, Mr. McDowell shared his extensive knowledge of Dave the Potter, including having played the role of Dave in the docudrama, "Filling the Gap." Mr. McDowell is in the process of relocating back to his ancestral home in Asheville, NC.
