Edgewood Borough recognized among first to become a certified sustainable municipality



Silver Award

Edgewood Borough is pleased to announce that it is among the first municipalities to become certified through the Southwestern Pennsylvania Sustainable Community Essentials Certification program. Edgewood is recognized at the Silver level of certification for meeting the program's rigorous performance criteria, which track 131 policies and practices that define a sustainable community.

The Sustainable Community Essentials Certification, developed by Sustainable Pittsburgh, is designed for municipalities that are working to save money, conserve resources, and serve vibrant communities. It applauds municipalities for their demonstrated commitment and sustainability performance.

In earning the Silver certification, Edgewood is acknowledged for its progress in addressing such areas as community design and land use, energy efficiency, health and wellness, mitigating blight, intergovernmental cooperation, recycling and waste reduction, fiscal controls, and internal management and operations. The Southwestern Pennsylvania Sustainable Community Essentials Certification is intended to bring recognition to municipalities in the region that are applying the policy and practice of sustainability as their mode of operation in order to advance community prosperity. It also serves as a mechanism for sharing best practices for creating a more sustainable southwestern Pennsylvania.

Meet the Public Works Department

The Edgewood Borough Public Works
Department works on projects vital
to the safety and maintenance of our
community. This four member department is responsible for the preservation of public infrastructure like storm
and sanitary sewers, street maintenance (including street sweeping), and
the upkeep of borough parks. They are
perhaps most visible to residents during fall leaf collection and winter snow
plowing. These employees are on call
24 hours a day, seven days a week to

respond to emergencies or weather events in Edgewood Borough.

This winter was particularly cold with major snow and ice accumulation. Our dedicated public works employees maintained the safety of our roads, putting in extensive overtime hours. They barely had a day off in two months!

Thanks to their hard work, Edgewood roads stayed free of snow and ice, allowing our residents to safely travel.

In the event of winter weather, the public works department's first priority is to plow and salt borough roads. When snow accumulates quickly, the plow trucks may have to make several trips through town in order to stay ahead of the snow. Once roads are safely passable, they clear the alleyways in the borough, and plow



the borough owned parking lots. After completing all this work, the employees shovel sidewalks in front of borough owned property.

Edgewood Recycles

Electronics Recycling

As of January 1, 2013, Pennsylvania banned the disposal of computers, TV's, and other electronic devices in the regular garbage. The reason for the "e-waste" ban in regular garbage is because these devices leak harmful metals such as cadmium, lead, and mercury into the waste stream. These items must be properly disposed of by facilities that can remove the toxic metals.

There are several sites near Edgewood that will accept e-waste. Additionally, there are "Hard to Recycle" events scheduled around Allegheny County over the next year that will collect these devices for small fees. Here is a list of your options for e-waste disposal.

Construction Junction accepts UNBROKEN (but do not have to be working) TVs, Monitors, LCDs, Laptop and Desktop Computers, cellphones, PDAs, fax machines, printers, copiers, remote controls, video recorders, and digital cameras. They do not accept broken devices with cracked screen glass or tubes; they also do not accept CD's, DVD's, VHS tapes, batteries, or lighting.

Please call before going to verify that they will accept your device. Not currently accepting TV's; still accepting computers, printers.

Best Buy, HHgregg, & Staples stores accept electronics, but call ahead to verify that they will accept your device.

To recycle CD's, DVD's, VHS tapes, batteries, or lighting (fluorescent bulbs, lamp ballasts), these devices need to be taken to eLoop LLC. Also call them for advice on disposing of cracked or broken e-waste devices.



WARMER WEATHER BRINGS MORE CRIME

Warmer weather is finally upon us after a long and very cold winter. It is that time of year when we all like to open our doors and windows and let the fresh air in.

Unfortunately, this is the time of year when the crime picks up and the criminals become more active. During the winter months, police calls seem to slow down, as criminals do not appear to like the cold. Now that it is getting warmer, the criminals will be walking around, looking for crimes of opportunity. These crimes include, but are not limited to, looking for open windows/doors in homes to commit burglaries. It seems that many of us feel a false sense of security, and leave a window open while we go to work, school, or just out to run some errands. This oversight can make you the victim of a crime.

Studies have shown that burglars choose the path of least resistance. In many cases, burglaries take place during daylight hours. A burglar may walk right up to your front door and ring the doorbell and knock. If there is no response, there is a good chance that no one is home. The burglar will then do a quick walk around your house to see if he/she can see any easy way into your home, including open windows/ doors. If you are one of those people who didn't think that leaving your window open was a big deal.....you are now the victim of a burglary.

We suggest never leaving your windows and doors open while you are away; however, we understand that it will be done. If you do plan on

opening your windows, a good practice is to open windows that can not be accessed from the ground.

Officers also would like to remind residents to keep their doors locked while they are home. Some criminals do not care whether or not you are home. If they see something in plain sight close to the door, they will simply open the door and grab it.

Officers always remind everyone to be vigilant and to report any suspicious activity around your home and neighborhood. If you question whether you should call the police...you should!!! That is what we are here for.

STREET SWEEPING

With the signs of spring also comes the resumption of street sweeping around the borough. Street sweeping will return on Wednesdays in April. Check the signs where you park to ensure that you are parking on the proper side of the street to avoid any unwanted fines.

NEW POLICE CAR

By the time this article comes out, the Edgewood Police will have another Dodge Charger on the road. The Edgewood Police are changing over to the Chargers, because Ford Motors stopped producing Crown Victorias. 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

A Place to Learn & Live: The New Residence at WPSD

The Western Pennsylvania School for the Deaf has embarked on an exciting new project that will benefit our current and future students—building a new Residence. This \$9.3 million project will position WPSD to continue to meet the evolving needs of its students and their families for many years to come.

The former dorm, built in the 1960's, was originally designed to be classrooms and was later converted into a living space. With the many upgrades needed to keep the building viable, it became apparent that the responsible path was to demolish the dorm and build a new Residence. The building was torn down in April of 2013 to allow for the new construction.

The new Residence is scheduled for completion in August of 2014 and will have six living suites, each with its own kitchen and living/study areas along with bedrooms and a bathroom, to foster a family atmosphere. Boys and girls will reside on separate floors, but will share a great room for social activities and meetings. Features such as a modern information technology network, as well as a geo-thermal heating and cooling system, will establish WPSD in the community as a standard-bearer for student-centered construction and energy-efficient design.


