

## 2016 Budget Highlights

- The 2016 General Fund Budget was approved by a unanimous vote of Council on December 21, 2015. The 2016 Budget sets revenues and expenses at \$3,316,517.
- The real estate property tax millage for 2015 will be 7.185 mills.
- As has been the case in the past three years, Council will continue to prioritize roadway repairs in 2016. Loan payments for previous roadwork will total \$114,600. In 2016 roadway improvements will total \$390,000, and will pave approximately 2,945 feet of roadway. This work is part of a long-term and ongoing roadway improvement plan, where roads will be paved each year to avoid having to incur debt to pave roads in the future.
- The salt storage facility is in poor condition, and in order to protect the Borough's investment in road salt, a new facility will be built in 2016. The new building will hold approximately 500 tons of road salt, and will be bid in early 2016.

## Budget Highlights (Continued from page 1)

- Health care premiums for the Borough's employees are expected to increase 10% in 2016, but final numbers are not yet known at the time of this newsletter's printing.
- The Borough's pension obligation in 2016 is \$144,566.
- The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania charges a tax on gallons of gasoline purchased in the state. A portion of this tax is distributed to municipalities to help offset the costs of road maintenance. The reimbursement is based on the number of road miles in the municipality and its population. This funding will increase in 2016. As a result, Edgewood Borough will receive \$83,290.33 from the state in 2016. This is an increase of almost \$8,000 over the Borough's 2015 allocation and an increase of over \$17,000 from the 2014 allocation. These funds go toward offsetting the costs of street lighting and road salt purchases.

#### **Republic Services Information**

Republic Services is now Edgewood's Trash Hauler and Recycling Collector! Below find all the information you need to continue to recycle as much as possible. If you have questions regarding Republic Services, call their customer service line at 412-429-2600.

Please place all of your recyclable materials loosely in your recycling bin. Do NOT put items in plastic bags. NO separating or sorting is needed. We'll do it for you! Here are examples of what you can put in your bin:

#### **Acceptable Materials for Biweekly Recycling:**

- Aluminum Cans
- Bottle Glass—all colors & shapes
- Clean Pizza Boxes
- Corrugated Cardboard-broken down so it is flat and no more than 3 feet in length or width and tied in a bundle
- Dry Food Boxes
- Junk Mail & Envelopes
- Magazines & Catalogs
- Newsprint & Inserts
- Office Paper
- Paperback Books
- Plastic Containers #1-7
- Plastic Milk Containers, Juice Boxes, etc.
- Phonebooks
- · Steel Cans
- Tissue Boxes

#### **Unacceptable Materials for Biweekly Recycling:**

- Aerosol Containers
- Boards
- Branches
- Ceramics or Dishware
- Diapers
- Electronics
- Grass Clippings
- Leaves
- Light Bulbs
- Mirrors
- Plate Glass, Pyrex or Window Glass
- Plastic Bags
- Plastic Utensils
- Plastic Wrapping Film
- Waxed Box Containers
- Styrofoam Materials
- Tires

Recycling services are every other week on Fridays along with regular trash. Pickup days will be pushed to Saturday if there is a holiday that week. You may continue to use your current recycling bin—there is no need to purchase a new one.

#### **Republic Services Collects Household Hazardous Waste** and E-Waste in Edgewood


Your hazardous waste and e-waste can now be safely collected by calling this toll-free number: 1-800-464-2120. Data destruction is assured.

Look through your home for hazardous items that need to be discarded—everything from batteries and paint to computers and chemicals—and feel secure that Republic Services will safely handle these items, protecting both you and the environment.

Residents who call will be asked to describe the items to be collected. They will be told how to package their household hazardous waste (HHW) in a special HHW Kit, which will be sent to residents. (Electronics do not need to be packaged.) Each kit includes a collection date, a 42-gallon clear plastic bag, and detailed instructions on how to package the items to be collected safely and securely. Both HHW and ewaste must be kept in a secure location, NOT at the curb, until collected.

On the day of collection, Republic Services will arrive at your home to collect the HHW packaged items and/or electronics to be taken for recycling or disposal.





#### Acceptable HHW and e-waste (5 gallons or less):

- Aerosols
- Batteries—Lead Acid, Alkaline, NiCad
- Cleaners—Acidic & Basic
- Discharge (HID) Lamps
- Ethylene Glycol, Antifreeze
- E-Waste—TVs, Computers, Monitors, VCR and DVD Players, Printers, Fax Machines, Cable Boxes, Gaming Equipment and similar electronic waste
- Light Bulbs—Fluorescents, Compact Fluorescents (CFL), High-Intensity
- Mercury, Mercury Debris
- Oil, Petroleum-based lubricants
- Paint—latex & Oil-based
- Paint thinners, Gasoline, Solvents
- Pesticides, Herbicides
- Pool Chemicals
- Resins and Epoxy

#### Unacceptable HHW and e-waste:

- Ammunition
- Asbestos
- Biological/Infectious Wastes
- Explosives
- Fire Extinguishers
- Medical Sharps (Call or visit Republic Services online for details for methods of disposing Medical Sharps)
- PCs (Polychlorinated Biphenyls)
- Pharmaceuticals/Controlled Substances
- Radioactive Compounds
- Smoke Detectors
- Tires



If any of the unacceptable items are placed for collection, a large Republic Services sticker will be placed on those items, explaining why they could not be collected.

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

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#### REPORTING SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Prevention is everyone's responsibility. We are one neighborhood, one state. one nation; and it is the responsibility of all to remain vigilant and to report suspicious behavior.

#### ONE CALL CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

#### Suspicious Activity—Trust Your **Instincts**

One of the most important roles you have as a member of our community is to report suspicious activity.

#### How do you determine what is suspicious activity?

A suspicious activity is when a person's conduct or action does not fit the normal day-to-day activity of our neighborhood—an occurrence that is out of place and should not be happening in our neighborhood.

**REMEMBER**—If you observe something unusual or think something looks wrong, follow your instinct and report it. You WILL NOT get in trouble with the police—and you WILL be doing a service to your community!

Consider the following activities as suspicious and call the police:

- A person or vehicle stays in the same place for an unusual length of time.
- A parked car with the engine running—regardless of a person inside or not.
- A person behaves strangely or exhibits unusual movements, looks out of place, or is wandering aimlessly.
- A person concealing an object, carrying a weapon or suspicious bag.
- A person looking into cars, moving from car to car, and/or tries door handles.
- A person looking into windows of homes, or forcibly entering a car or
- A person running from a home for no apparent reason, especially at night.
- A person carrying/transporting unusual/valuable objects, day or night.
- A person sells/conducts business out of their car, van, truck, or other vehicle.
- A vehicle drives around your block frequently, slowing down, speeding up.

#### • A vehicle without lights on, arriving or leaving at night.

- A person you don't know offering candy or gifts to children.
- A person leaving a neighbor's house who isn't the neighbor or someone you recognize or uniformed.

Many activities can be considered suspicious. And, there could be reasonable explanations for some suspicious activities. By thinking things through, being observant and using common sense, you will be able to make a good judgment about whether an activity is suspicious. Your role as a concerned citizen is to report whatever you think is wrong or suspicious.

#### **Reporting Suspicious Activity**

Police Emergency Number—911 If you suspect that the suspicious behavior that you detected is actually a crimein-progress, please call the police emergency number. Remain calm. Avoid taking any risks. Your safety is most important. Keep away from the crime scene to preserve evidence.

Information that the police telecommunicator needs include:

- What is the person's last known location and direction of travel?
- What made the person's actions suspicious?
- Did the person say anything? If so, what?

- Did the person appear intoxicated?
- Were any weapons displayed or was there threat of a weapon?

Also, be prepared to give information about the person including:

- Race
- Sex
- Age • Height
- Weight
- Complexion
- Eye and hair color
- Facial hair
- Scars
- Tattoos

Finally, if the suspicious person is in a vehicle, please provide the vehicle make, model, color, and license plate number if you can, along with any other identifiable aspects.

#### Remember!

If it's suspicious to you, then it's suspicious to the police. It's better to be safe than sorry.

In your neighborhood, the police don't always know what is suspicious and what is not. So, it's up to you to let the Edgewood Police Department know when you see suspicious activity!

Remember-you are our best defense against crime. One call can make a difference!



#### Journey to Beethoven's 9th with the ESO

Did you know that Beethoven, Dvorak, Mahler and Schubert all died soon after completing their 9th Symphonies? Mahler was so terrified of the "Curse of the 9th" that he refused to number his symphonies. Composer Arnold Schoenberg (who only wrote 2 symphonies and lived a good long life) wrote: "It seems that the Ninth is a limit. He who wants to go beyond it must pass away. It seems as if something might be imparted to us in the Tenth which we ought not yet to know, for which we are not ready. Those who have written a Ninth stood too close to the hereafter."

Many composers have escaped this so-called curse—for example, Mozart finished 41 symphonies and Haydn made it all the way to 106.

The ESO performed Schubert's huge 9th Symphony in October as a warm up to a 5 year long project of playing all of Beethoven's 9 Symphonies. Join them on this journey, starting in May with Beethoven's Symphony No. 1.

#### **HOME DELIVERED MEALS**



The goal of this scholarship program is to honor Mel's legacy by benefitting young people in Edgewood. Mel grew up here, graduated from Edgewood High School in 1970 and the University of Pittsburgh. He married

his high school sweetheart, raised two wonderful children, and established a successful business career. Mel actively volunteered in multiple community service roles in Edgewood, ranging from volunteer fireman to Little League coach to church deacon, before he passed in an airplane accident in 1994. These facts only hint at Mel's true legacy, which is the wide circle of lives he enriched with his larger-than-life personality, unquenchable spirit, and deep commitment to serving others.

The Mel Douglass Fund has awarded these scholarships every year since 2008. Eight Mel Douglass Scholarships and 33 honorable mention scholarships have been awarded to date. Jenna Hebert, one of our 2012 winners and a senior at the University of Pennsylvania, was recently named a 2016 Rhodes Scholar.
