

Each driver with a vehicle registered in the Borough is able to purchase a Residential on-street parking pass. A Visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the Borough. The fees for on-street parking permits, as well as Borough off-street lots and recreational/commercial vehicles, are listed below. Permits for 2017 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 1, 2016.

Applications for the Borough's off-street parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2016. On December 15, 2016, permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.





#### Edgewood Police Are the First to be Trained to "Stop the Bleed"

Injury can strike anywhere and anytime resulting in catastrophic bleeding which if not controlled quickly can result in death.

On August 2<sup>nd</sup> the Edgewood Police Department attended a special class to learn how to stop bleeding when it occurs to a bystander, and also how to take care of themselves or their fellow officers if injury and bleeding occur. As part of the "Stop the Bleed" campaign which was launched by the White House in October of 2015, UPMC in collaboration with regional trauma centers is leading a three state initiative to increase awareness and education. The goal of Stop the Bleed is to decrease the number of preventable deaths from bleed-



ing by training law enforcement officers and citizen bystanders to apply simple bleeding control techniques when disaster strikes and place bleeding control equipment in public accessible areas. The Edgewood Police Department was the first law enforcement agency to receive the training in Western Pennsylvania.

Raquel Forsythe MD, associate director of trauma surgery at UPMC Presbyterian and Ben Reynolds PA-C, a trauma surgery physician assistant, both Edgewood residents, conducted the two hour class at the Edgewood Borough Building and trained all Edgewood police officers in these





critical life-saving skills. "We want to save as many lives as possible with this training and do what we can to keep our officers safe." said Dr. Forsythe "Police officers face dangers every day and risk injury to themselves to protect us. This training is important for their safety."

In addition to the training, each officer was provided a bleeding control kit which contains a tourniquet and medicated gauze to keep with them on patrol.

# Learn about Beethoven with the ESO

Although the Edgewood Symphony Orchestra's 29th season is dedicated to American composers, the journey to perform all nine of Beethoven's symphonies will continue in the coming year. The ESO performed Beethoven's first symphony in May, and audiences can look forward to Beethoven's Symphony No. 2 on October 15.

As Beethoven was turning 30, he began to lose his hearing. He reported a constant "roar" in his ears that made it difficult to talk with others and appreciate music. He was quick to fly into a rage and often avoided conversation.

In 1802, his doctors sent him to Heiligenstadt, a small town outside of Vienna. They thought the quiet of the countryside might help his hearing return. While there, he realized that his hearing loss was likely going to be permanent.

Dealing with depression and fear for the future of his chosen career (he couldn't yet know that he would go on to compose some of history's most significant and beloved music without being able to hear a thing), Beethoven wrote his second symphony during this time in the country. He gave the work a humorous and happy air, while pushing the boundaries of the traditional symphony.

most of Wilkinsburg, and all of the Borough of Edgewood—and of course, Frick Park.

Lower Frick Park is the area most associated with Nine Mile Run, as the site of the major stream and wetland restoration that was completed in 2006. Ten years

Ten years later, park users can enjoy great trails and abundant wildlife in the restored area, but unfortunately the water quality in the Nine Mile Run stream, while dramatically improved, is still not at an acceptable level. Much of our work is focused on continued monitoring of water quality and habitat in the park, and on projects in the upper watershed communities that will have a direct positive impact on the health and safety of the stream. Many of these projects, such as street tree plantings, also enhance the quality of life for residents of the watershed.

Friends of Dickson Park is a volunteer group of local residents with a shared mission to revitalize Dickson Park as a community treasure. Dickson Park is a former multi-use community park on the southeastern border of Edgewood. The Friends have been working with the Edgewood Borough Council to redevelop the area and presented a proposal at the August 15 Edgewood Borough Council meeting which outlined a strategic plan to designate part of the space as a fenced, off-leash dog run.

In conjunction with Community Day, the Friends launched a raffle to help raise funds for this first phase of redevelopment. 


#### **Edgewood Historical Society**

A century ago, Pennsylvania Railroad undertook a years-long, \$3-million project to raise its tracks 12 feet between Homewood and Edgewood in order to eliminate dangerous, street-level grade crossings. Construction began in 1912 in Homewood and was completed in 1916 in Edgewood, according to a 1940 history of Wilkinsburg—our neighboring community that strongly pushed for the public safety improvements. Edgewood joined other communities along the tracks in June 1916 for a three-day celebration that was punctuated by a parade that stretched four miles and attracted 75,000 people.

Evidence of the project can still be seen today. The overpass across Race Street was built in order for the railroad tracks to span a small stream that once flowed where the roadway now stands. Concrete extensions were added to the bridge to raise the tracks several feet. Look up. They are still there.





## A note from the tax collector...

The Edgewood Borough 2016 Real Estate tax was mailed out in April and is now due at penalty until December 5th. I will be sending out reminders in October. Any unpaid tax will be sent to Pennsylvania Municipal Services in December.

The 2016-2017 Woodland Hills School Tax is due at face until October 31st. If you are paying in installments, the second installment is due October 31st and the third installment is due February 28th. You will only receive one sheet of paper for the second and third installment coupons so do not throw the 3rd coupon away.

I want to remind everyone to please make sure that your check is made out correctly and is legible. If I have to send a check back to you and it is the last couple days of discount you will then have to pay the amount at face. Once that date is past due I can not accept it. The bank will reject a check if the numeric portion and the written portion are different so it is your responsibility to make sure the amounts are correct. I have guidelines I have to follow.

I try to make sure bills are sent to the correct homeowner, but occasionally the county is slow in getting the information to me. If you recently purchased your home and are not sure if a tax has been paid you can call my office at 412-731-0200. If you have changed mortgage companies or are now paying your taxes yourself, you must notify my office so it can be changed.

I want to thank everyone for your patience and condolences. My mom passed away the end of July so my office was closed for two weeks.
