From The Manager's Desk

Each driver with a vehicle registered in the Borough is able to purchase a Residential on-street parking pass. A Visitor's pass may also be purchased. Visitor passes may not be used on any vehicle registered within the Borough. The fees for onstreet parking permits, as well as Borough off-street lots and recreational/commercial vehicles, are listed below. Permits for 2017 will be available at the Borough Building beginning December 1, 2016.

Applications for the Borough's off-street parking lots will be accepted starting on December 1, 2016. On December 15, 2016, permits will be issued based upon requests. If more applications are received than there are available parking spaces, a lottery will be held. No resident will be issued a second permit until all initial requests are processed.

Winter Safety Tips

Our Pittsburgh winters can be beautiful, yet cold and snowy conditions can also present safety challenges. Below are some simple safety tips to keep you safe and warm this winter.

Vehicle Safety

- Be prepared. Keep extra blankets, flashlight, ice scraper, warning devices (e.g. flares, reflectors), jumper cables, first aid kit, snow shovel and rock salt or sand, bottled water and snacks, in your vehicle.
- Always have a cell phone with you (but don't keep it in the car).

Driving Safety

- If your car is parked outside, make sure the exhaust pipe and the area around it is clear of snow before you start the car.
- In icy and snowy conditions, drive slowly, allow plenty of stopping time, and pay attention to the road and other drivers.
- If you get stuck in the snow, light two flares and place one at each end of the car, a safe distance away. Make sure snow isn't blocking the exhaust pipe, and stay in the vehicle with a window open slightly to allow fresh air.

Home Safety

- Be prepared. Have a week's worth of food, drinking water, medicine and prescription drugs, pet food, and safety supplies on hand.
- Do not leave lit candles unattended.
- Keep your sidewalks and driveway clear of snow each day. If you are unable to remove it, contact a willing neighbor or a snow removal business to do it for you.
- For those going away this season, snow left on the driveway and sidewalk for a period of time can be a dead giveaway that you aren't home, so arrange for it to be cleared every day.

Winter Landscaping Best **Practices from Nine Mile Run** Watershed Association

NINE MILE RUN WATERSHED ASSOCIATION **CELEBRATING 15 YEARS**

Here are ten maintenance items to consid-

er for your gardens and trees in the late fall and into the winter. This is a great time to prepare your yard for the upcoming spring and set your plants up for success.

- 1. Mulch your garden and tree beds to insulate them over the winter.
- 2. Instead of bagging all of your leaves in the fall, use them as organic mulch in your garden. If there are large amounts of leaves, shred and compost them.
- 3. Cover the stems of thin-barked, young trees in sunny areas with a light colored wrap to avoid sunscald and frost cracks.
- 4. Pruning perennial plants can differ by species, but try to keep pruning to a minimum.
- 5. Divide perennial plants and replant in the fall to promote growth in the spring.
- 6. Prune your oak trees during this time to avoid oak wilt infection.
- 7. Water your young evergreens during warm and dry periods—they can experience drought stress even in the winter.
- 8. Cover evergreen shrubs or trees that are susceptible to street salt.
- 9. Be thoughtful with your ice melting salt use and avoid overapplication in root areas of your favorite trees and shrubs. Shovel snow early and often to reduce the need for salt.
- 10. Inspect your deciduous trees as broken branches will be more easily observed during this time.
