he Borough of Edgewood is looking for volunteers for its planning commission and civil service commission. Interested candidates should submit letters of interest and any relevant qualifications to manager@ edgewoodboro.com.

Planning Commission member responsibilities include applying the borough zoning code to new and existing development, interpreting and enforcing the borough zoning code, and acting as an advisory body to Borough Council on all planning and development matters. Members are appointed to a four year term.

Civil Service Commissioners are appointed by borough council to uphold the civil service rules of the borough. Commissioners are responsible for hiring, promoting, and disciplining police officers under the direction of the Borough Code and civil service rules. Members are appointed to a six year term. Applications for this position must be received by December 14, 2018.

REMINDER: Recycling Changes in Effect

Any recyclable items inside plastic bags (blue or other color) deposited at the curb WILL NOT be picked up by recycling.

These items will be tagged and left at the pickup location as a notification that these are no longer accepted for recycling. After the first notification, any items inside plastic bags will be picked up by trash collectors and taken to the landfill. Additional recycling bins may be purchased at the Borough Building for \$20.

Be sure to remove all food waste from all containers. Remaining food waste in recyclables can contaminate an entire load rendering it unrecyclable.



Watershed Forest Master Plan

Nine Mile Run's new Watershed Forest Master Plan, published this December, includes a series of recommendations which will put us back on the path toward reversing the trend of watershed canopy loss and eventually increasing the watershed canopy. Between 2010 and 2015 the watershed experienced 97 acres of lost tree canopy, the equivalent of one city lot every other day. Through a targeted community effort-working with residents, businesses, and local government-we hope to facilitate a reinvestment in our region's trees. The plan is a guide to a future where existing trees are better maintained and cared for, and new trees are planted and supported such that they can replace the existing canopy as it begins to age and decay.

We're excited about the direction this new plan will take us; it was crafted by and for residents and stakeholders of the watershed, and with your help we can reverse the trend of tree canopy loss in the watershed. 

Police Report

The Edgewood Police Department would like to pass along important information from an article published by the Mayo Clinic Staff about Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) is a mental health condition that's triggered by a terrifying event—either experiencing it or witnessing it. Symptoms may include flashbacks, nightmares and severe anxiety, as well as uncontrollable thoughts about the event.

Most people who go through traumatic events may have temporary difficulty adjusting and coping, but with time and good self-care, they usually get better. If the symptoms get worse, last for months or even years, and interfere with your dayto-day functioning, you may have PTSD.

Getting effective treatment after PTSD symptoms develop can be critical to reduce symptoms and improve function.

Post-traumatic stress disorder symptoms may start within one month of a traumatic event, but sometimes symptoms may not appear until years after the event. These symptoms cause significant problems in social or work situations and in relationships. They can also interfere with your ability to go about your normal daily tasks.

PTSD symptoms are generally grouped into four types: intrusive memories, avoidance, negative changes in thinking and mood, and changes in physical and emotional reactions. Symptoms can vary over time or vary from person to person.

Intrusive memories Symptoms of intrusive memories

may include:

- Recurrent, unwanted distressing memories of the traumatic event
- Reliving the traumatic event as if it were happening again (flashbacks)
- Upsetting dreams or nightmares about the traumatic event
- Severe emotional distress or physical reactions to something that reminds you of the traumatic event

Avoidance

Symptoms of avoidance may include:

- Trying to avoid thinking or talking about the traumatic event
- Avoiding places, activities or people that remind you of the traumatic event

Negative changes in thinking and mood

Symptoms of negative changes in thinking and mood may include:

- Negative thoughts about yourself, other people or the world
- Hopelessness about the future
- Memory problems, including not remembering important aspects of the traumatic event
- · Difficulty maintaining close relationships
- Feeling detached from family and friends
- Lack of interest in activities you once enjoyed
- Difficulty experiencing positive emotions
- Feeling emotionally numb



Changes in physical and emotional reactions

Symptoms of changes in physical and emotional reactions (also called arousal symptoms) may include:

- Being easily startled or frightened
- · Always being on guard for danger
- Self-destructive behavior, such as drinking too much or driving too fast
- Trouble sleeping
- Trouble concentrating
- Irritability, angry outbursts or aggressive behavior
- Overwhelming guilt or shame

For children 6 years old and younger, signs and symptoms may also include:

- Re-enacting the traumatic event or aspects of the traumatic event through play
- Frightening dreams that may or may not include aspects of the traumatic event

Intensity of symptoms

PTSD symptoms can vary in intensity over time. You may have more PTSD symptoms when you're stressed in general, or when you come across reminders of what you went through. For example, you may hear a car backfire and relive combat experiences. Or you may see a report on the news about a sexual assault and feel overcome by memories of your own assault.

When to see a doctor

If you have disturbing thoughts and feelings about a traumatic event for more than a month, if they're severe,



or if you feel you're having trouble getting your life back under control, talk to your doctor or a mental health professional. Getting treatment as soon as possible can help prevent PTSD symptoms from getting worse.

If you have suicidal thoughts

If you or someone you know has suicidal thoughts, get help right away through one or more of these resources:

Make an appointment with your doctor or a mental health professional.

When to get emergency help

If you know someone who's in danger of attempting suicide or has made a suicide attempt, make sure someone stays with that person to keep him or her safe. Call 911 or your local emergency number immediately. Or, if you can do so safely, take the person to the nearest hospital emergency room

2018 Limpert Award Winner: Amy Andrews

The Edgewood Foundation is honored to announce that Amy Andrews has been given the William D. Limpert Award for Community Service at our Wine & Chocolate event held at the Edgewood Clubhouse on October 27, 2018. The award originated in 1991, and is named for the founder of the Edgewood Foundation. It's given to an Edgewood resident whose contributions have served in making our community a desirable place to live, and whose dedication has improved the lives of those who live here.

Amy joined the Edgewood Foundation board in 2004 and was elected President in 2006. She served as Board President until 2014, when she moved to the role of Vice President, serving an additional two years before retiring from the board in 2016.

Her most enduring work while serving on the Board went into establishing partnerships between the Edgewood Foundation, Borough council, government and other community organizations. It was through her desire to coordinate the goals of the Edgewood Foundation with local government and other local orga nizations that she served to foster the quality of events that we participate in as Edgewood residents each and every year. She was (and is) an active supporter, proponent and participant in nearly every community activity, always seeking a way to foster greater involvement, greater participation and communication between residents and local organizations.

As a result of her commitment to these partnerships, while acting as Board President, she was instrumental in spearheading the effort to secure grant funds for new playground equipment at Koenig Field. She worked with the Board in raising additional funds and partnered with the Borough in the planning and construction of the newest children's play area.

By working with the Borough council and management she helped to ensure that our Edgewood Community Day continued as a quality event bringing together neighbors and families. The Edgewood Fire Department continues their involvement with Edgewood community events in part because of the work she did while serving on the Edgewood Board.

Given all those efforts, she may yet be most well known for her work as chief coordinator of the annual Edgewood Progressive Dinner. Her involvement grew this annual event into a real Edgewood tradition and ensured that Edgewood remains a community of friends as well as neighbors.



Brian Finch shared a treasure trove of information he discovered about his house on Walnut Street, as shown in







this old photo and map section. The house was built in July 1888-"... this would make my house just very slightly older than Edgewood," Brian noted. The village was incorporated as a borough in December 1888-and was first occupied by attorney Henry Bigger and his wife, Sallie Pears Bigger-the daughter of John Pears of Bakewell, Pears & Company, a prominent glass house company on the South Side.



A note from the real estate tax collector...

The 2018 Edgewood Borough real estate tax is due at penalty and will be turned over the delinguent tax collector the end of December. Please have your payments sent to me by December 5th to avoid any additional penalties. These payments should be made out to Maureen Smith, Tax Collector or Edgewood Borough..

The 2018 Woodland Hills School tax is also due at penalty unless you are paying in installments. The first installment had to be made by October 31!! The second installment is due by Jan 31, 2019. These checks should be made out to Maureen Smith. Tax Collector or Woodland Hills.

When paying your taxes, I cannot accept a check made out to Edgewood Borough for the school taxes, it is a different account which goes directly to the school district. Also make sure your written amount and your numeric amounts are the same and legible, the banks are refusing more checks because of this. If you are paying close to the due date, please put your phone number on your check so that if there is a mistake I can call you and we can fix the problem

I have had complaints about my office hours. The job of a tax collector is a part time, elected position and the only time I am required by law to be in my office is during the last two weeks of the discount periods. I choose to be in the office for the convenience of the residents. I also work in my office during off hours to get my work done, deposits, reports, tax certifications and answering phone calls. I try to make all changes in ownership, address changes and assessments changes as I get them but sometimes these slip through the cracks. If you do not receive a tax bill in April for the borough or in July for Woodland Hills call my office, don't wait! Residents have two months to pay them at discount, I do not send out another bill until they are due at penalty because, by tax collectors law, I'm not allowed to. I do not purposely wait for the penalty period to send you another bill, I do not get additional compensation if your bill is paid at penalty. I will help you with a problem any time I can, just ask, but I cannot waive penalties or accept a payment past the due date, I don't have the authority to do that. So if you have a true problem, feel free to call my office at 412-731-0200 and I will return your call when I get in.

I would like to thank the residents for your kindness and understanding this past year. Merry Christmas, Happy Holidays and also Happy New Year!
