

Grant funding announcements

Edgewood Borough Council is excited to announce that the borough is receiving a total of \$684,000 in grant funding for three projects. The funding will be spent reconstructing the stairs leading from Garland Street to Koenig Field, addressing the sanitary sewer overflow near Koenig Field and constructing storm sewers on Elmer and Beech streets. Borough Council would like to thank Edgewood Mayor Ryan O'Donnell, State Senator Jay Costa and State Representative Abigail Salisbury for their assistance with this funding. Construction of all three projects is tentatively scheduled to start in 2024.

Pedestrian Bulb Outs

Pittsburgh Regional Transit (formerly the Port Authority of Allegheny County) is constructing two pedestrian bulb-outs along Edgewood Avenue at Gordon Street and Elm Street to accommodate departing riders. Crosswalks will be established at these intersections so that pedestrians can access the eastern side of the street. Construction will take place over the summer of 2023.

Make Music Day June 21

Edgewood Borough will again participate in the national Make Music Day on June 21, 2023. A time has not yet been determined but the event will occur later in the day, likely in the evening to accommodate more participants. Edgewood Towne Center Now Offers Four EVgo Charging Stations—Phillips Edison and Company

o vou have an electric car? Now you can charge your car while you shop, eat, exercise, get your taxes done or take advantage of the many other stores and services at Edgewood Towne Center on South Braddock Avenue. The property, anchored by Giant Eagle and Planet Fitness, recently added four electric vehicle (EV) EVgo charging stations.

With electric car sales in the United States accounting for 4.6 percent of all car sales in 2021, demand for EV charging stations is higher than ever before. The new station at Edgewood Towne Center serves four charging stalls with a high-power 350kW fast charger, capable of charging two vehicles simultaneously, and two 100kW fast chargers, each capable of charging one vehicle.

The EVgo fast charging stations can charge a vehicle up to 80% in 15-45 minutes (Actual charging speeds

depend on the capability of the vehicle). For drivers who have CCS-compatible vehicles, including Tesla models with a CCS Combo 1 adapter, Autocharge+ makes the fast charging experience even faster. Once enrolled, customers can start a charge just by plugging in, no extra steps needed. Drivers have five payment options for their EVgo charging session, including the EVgo app, Autocharge+, the EVgo program card, roaming partner RFID card, or via credit card (subject to a small transaction fee). EVgo offers a range of different

charging plans to fit all drivers, whether they charge every week, every month or just on road trips. Customers can find the plan that's right for them with EVgo's Plan Finder tool.

EVgo also offers benefits for drivers, like earning points toward charging credit with EVgo Rewards[®] and the EVgo app, which gives customers access to real-time charger availability, helps them locate nearby stations and allows them to filter for chargers by power level and connector type.

House History Research







Tee-ball is for girls and boys ages 4-7, with the addition this year of 4 yearolds. Children should be 4 as of June 1st. Also new this year, if registration numbers allow, we are planning to break participants into two divisions: Division 1 (4/5 year-olds), and Division 2 (6/7 year-olds). Division 1 will focus on player participation and learning basic skills. Each child gets to bat and field each inning, with all games being played from the Tee. Division 2 will build on the basics, and introduce more team-based skills, with position play, and counting of outs (no strike-outs). Depending on progression of the group, Division 2 has the potential to move to coach-pitch later in the season. This sport will meet twice weekly; days and times are TBD. 

Attic Heat Loss and Snow Maps

In the December/January newsletter there was a short segment alerting residents to the creation of a snow map to highlight heat loss through attics. In short, aerial photos would be taken immediately after a snow fall to show how the snow melts off a hot roof. While we had a relatively snow-less winter, just enough snow fell on January 31 & February 1, 2023 to demon-


How to interpret the snow cover

The slope of the roof may impact how quickly the snow disappears from the roof, and wind and southern exposure to sun also plays a role. But this map was made on January 31 and February 1, 2023 and there was hardly any sun before the pictures were taken and no wind.

Complicated roof shapes are harder to air seal and insulate and these homes will often have more heat loss through the roof than a gable or hip roof.

The two circled homes have almost the same roof shape but clearly different roof temperatures. The home furthest left of the circle with its bare roof shows the most heat loss. Almost all of the snow has melted while the home furthest right of

the circle shows almost no heat loss since its roof remains completely snow covered. The bare roofed homes on left side of the photo will experience the biggest energy efficiency gain by adding attic insulation. The investment will pay off fast and will



be beneficial for both winter and summer. The home on the right side of the circle likely has some spots through which the heat escapes. Maybe there is a knee wall or attic access where the insulation is missing or a large area of air leak around the lighting fixture or around a bathroom fan in the floor below. Each of those could cause excessive heat loss through the roof and is also worth correcting.

The diagram on the left shows typical areas where conditioned air leaks from living spaces into the attic. A contractor should close off all air leaks and then add missing insulation. The step of air sealing the area between the conditioned space and the roof is more important than adding insulation. Failing to air seal greatly diminishes the performance of any additional insulation because insulation itself does not prevent air movement.

It's worth pointing out that although skilled DIY'ers may attempt to tackle an insulating project, they should still mind any possible dangers like exposed or outdated wiring, fire hazards like light fixtures and bathroom fans, and placing insulation too close to chimney flues. It's best to consult an experienced and licensed contractor who can safely complete the project.

Here are several resources for homeowners or renters that can be:

- 1. One can claim a tax credit for 30% of the cost of improvement up to \$600 each year for improving air sealing and insulation. Those with incomes below 80% area median income could wait for a larger discount of \$1600 which is expected to be made available later in 2023 or beginning of 2024, and which can be combined with the \$600 tax break. The cost of improving the attic varies depending on size and complexity and may range from \$1,500 to \$5000, or more.

When considering the project, one should be aware that cellulose insulation is the greenest among options and the spray foam has the biggest global warming impact unless one selects HFO products, like https://henry.com/commercial/ spray-foam-insulation/permax-3-0-hfo-closed-cell-foam-insulation. Mineral wool batts are excellent performers.
- 6. Several insulation contractors who work in our region and have a good track record (they know to air seal before insulating): Mincin Insulation Insulwise

7. Lastly, the Pennsylvania Weatherization Field Guide (WAP) offers recommendations on how to weatherize homes. Page 181 has an excellent solution for how to improve the flat roof in row houses. Very few contractors understand how to do this correctly.
